The July 29, 2024, Public Hearing of the Zelienople Borough Council was called to order at 6:30 PM, as advertised, by Council President Mary Hess in the Council Chambers located at 111 W New Castle St., Zelienople, PA 16063 and was handed over to Mrs. Bonnie Brimmeier, Legal Counsel, to conduct the hearing. This meeting was held in an in-person environment as well as remotely through the WebEx technology to comply with the safety of all concerned and to allow for offsite participation. It still complied with all rules of advertisement and the public had access to the meeting and was able to participate. The purpose of the hearing is to receive public comment on the proposed creation of a stormwater authority. In-person attendants were Council Members Mary Hess, Andrew Mathew III, Doug Foyle, Steve Schoppe, Spencer Mathew, Dan Fritch, Gregg Semel, and Mayor Thomas Oliverio. Junior Council Member Kyra Fazio did not attend.

7	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: All right. It's
8	6:30. Typically at a hearing we don't do this, but I am
9	going to ask everybody to stand for the Pledge of
10	Allegiance.
11	(Pledge of Allegiance.)
12	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: This is a public
13	hearing. Your comments will be recorded by a court
14	reporter. I'm going to turn the meeting over to our
15	solicitor, Bonnie Brimmeier, and she will be running the
16	meeting. And she will be giving you direction on how we
17	will proceed.
18	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Good evening, everyone.
19	My name is Bonnie Brimmeier. If you're having trouble
20	hearing anybody, please let us know.
21	As Mary has said, this will be for the Zelienople
22	residents only for multiple reasons. We have a time
23	constraint and there have been hearings for the other
24	municipality residents in their own community. So, we
25	want to hear from the Borough residents tonight.

1	If you come up to speak, please state your name
2	and address. We would ask while we're happy to hear
3	from anyone who wants to speak from a resident
4	standpoint, but if we're repeating the same things, just
5	in the interest of time, if we could just say I agree
6	with what's been said or something to that effect.
7	Most importantly, we want to be respectful.
8	Council will respectfully listen to you and we would
9	like you to be respectful to them.
10	With that being said, we'll try to limit people to
11	three minutes unless, you know, there's something really
12	pressing, but we would like to so that everybody has a
13	chance to talk because we do have a council meeting at
14	7:30.
15	Do we have a sign-up sheet?
16	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: We do.
17	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: The first person who
18	signed up is Jerry Maharg. And it says you're from 143
19	Oakdale Drive, Zelienople.
20	JERRY MAHARG: That's correct. My name is
21	Jerry Maharg. I'm at 143 Oakdale Drive, Zelienople.
22	And I'm speaking today to express concern regarding the
23	new Southwest Butler Stormwater Authority. These are
24	just a few concerns and questions regarding formation
25	and regulation.

1	As I understand it, each municipality appoints a
2	representative to serve a one year term and together
3	elect one at-large member. Who determines which
4	municipality provides the at-large member?
5	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: So, Jerry, just for
6	your information, and I don't know if we shared this at
7	the beginning, this is a hearing where you give your
8	comments. We are not to respond at the hearing.
9	JERRY MAHARG: Okay.
10	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: But you asked the
11	question and we will make sure you get the answer.
12	JERRY MAHARG: Okay. Very good. Thanks.
13	So, the next question is, does the at-large member have
14	voting privileges in determining which projects take
15	precedence over others? And is it required that
16	potential board members have some certification,
17	education, and/or experience in stormwater treatment?
18	Will the board members have the authority to negotiate
19	loans to finance projects? What is the maximum amount
20	the authority can borrow and who approves the method of
21	repayment? Thank you.
22	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: Jerry, if you have
23	those written, would it be possible that those are
24	e-mailed to the Borough as well?
25	JERRY MAHARG: I can do that, yep.

1	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: Thank you.
2	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Thank you. Jan Maharg.
3	It says you're also at 143 Oakdale Drive.
4	JAN MAHARG: I live with the handsome one.
5	He's my other half. He's the better half actually.
6	My concern on this stormwater is the taxes. I'm
7	Jan Maharg, 143 Oakdale Drive, Zelienople, 16063.
8	Regarding the taxes, who does collect the taxes? And
9	what are the actual fee for the taxes? What will it be?
10	How big will this be? How small will this be? Is there
11	an annual tax assessment? And if so, is there a limit
12	to the amount of annual tax increase? Is this going to
13	build up as the time goes on? And who provides
14	financial oversight on this authority?
15	I have a hard time with a stormwater fee or taxes
16	because I feel that there should be a moratorium on
17	building until we get this water straightened out. And
18	I know there's all kinds of stuff written about that,
19	but I think the wrong people are paying for the water
20	problem. And I don't think the residents should be
21	burdened with it as much as it is. I think there should
22	be an accountability to the builders and the amount of
23	drainage Zelienople gets. Thank you.
24	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: And if we can do the
25	same with your questions, if you have them written.

1	JAN MAHARG: Yes.
2	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Thank you. Sarah
3	Elliott. 204 1/2 Pennsylvania Avenue, Zelienople.
4	SARAH ELLIOTT: Hello. My name is Sarah
5	Elliott. And yes, I'm at 204 1/2 Pennsylvania Avenue.
6	Hi, counsel members and public. I'm new to Zelienople,
7	so I'll be the first to admit I am on a bigger learning
8	curve than everyone else. So, I have not read every
9	line of every proposal and of every statute yet, but
10	it's a passion of mine.
11	And so, I just wanted to comment that I certainly
12	think that hearing people so far speak to, you know,
13	taxes, whether it's a one time rate, whether it's a fee
14	for the year, what I did read was a very nominal fee, a
15	very small fee for most people. But, I certainly think
16	that, you know, sharing the love, so to speak, with the
17	amount of money that is across the board that can be
18	raised, whether it's through funding opportunities,
19	grant funding opportunities, which it sounds like that
20	was exhausted and that's where we are today. But I
21	certainly think that looking at different fees that
22	aren't going to be, you know.
23	I personally support a fee structure and I
24	personally wouldn't mind a tax raise if it meant that

the stormwater is taken care of properly because the

Т	amount of damage that we've already sustained since
2	moving here. We were part of that fun springtime
3	drenching, which is only going to continue to increase.
4	So, I certainly think that I probably am in the
5	minority here. I certainly support the authority, but I
6	encourage everybody to look at alternate funding sources
7	so that, yes, the public is not taxed and/or put out of
8	their homes but certainly willing to pay into what could
9	potentially be something that is shared across the
10	community for the greater good of the community. I
11	certainly echo that anybody who is doing any kind of
12	building or development should potentially have to carry
13	a heavier load than just the folks that live here
14	because they do pay into public utilities.
15	So, that's my comment for now and I look forward
16	to joining you guys in the future. Thank you.
17	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm sorry. Your
18	microphone is overmodulated. We can't understand what
19	she said. It sounds like a drive-thru at McDonald's.
20	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: We'll take care of
21	it. Thank you.
22	(Microphone adjusted.)
23	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: John Beighey. 191 Front
24	Street. I'm assuming that's Zelienople.
25	JOHN BETCHEY. First of all decide if I have

1	the privilege of speaking. I am a property owner in
2	Zelienople. I'm representing BNZ Materials, an employer
3	along the creek. I have to find out if I'm eligible to
4	speak. I'm a property owner in Zelienople, but I'm here
5	principally representing BNZ Materials, a factory along
6	the creek at the west end of the town. So
7	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: Are you an owner of
8	BNZ Materials?
9	JOHN BEIGHEY: I am not, but I do own
10	property in Zelienople. Two different properties. I
11	just happen to live in upper Harmony. So, shall I speak
12	or not?
13	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: Will you be impacted
14	by this stormwater fee and will you have to pay a fee if
15	the stormwater authority is formed
16	JOHN BEIGHEY: Yes. Personally and
17	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: in this
18	community?
19	JOHN BEIGHEY: my employer will.
20	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: From Zelienople?
21	JOHN BEIGHEY: Yes.
22	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: Okay.
23	JOHN BEIGHEY: Yes.
24	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Then yes, that's fine.
25	JOHN BEIGHEY: All right. All right. I'm

here principally speaking on behalf of my employer. We are probably at the lowest elevation level within the Borough. So, each event that gets above 14 feet at the Army Corps of Engineers watering station down by Riverside High School impacts our factory here. We are a quiet impact. And two or three times a year, water comes into the factory and then we deal with it.

We have 200,000 acres -- yeah, I wish. 200,000 square feet under roof and about 20 acres. I'm concerned that the fee structure is undefined at this point, to the best of my knowledge. I have an assumption that we will be impacted heavily being we're probably the third largest facility within the Borough. And yet we are likely one of the most impacted of all of the residents and facilities within the Borough.

I am also concerned that based on input at other public or other Borough's Q and A's that projects have not been well defined going into establishing the authority. I have a sense that that's to be determined after the fact. And yet here I am as representing this employer as potentially having a very heavy financial impact with very little prospect of benefit.

And so, I would leave it with you all to take it under advisement to define what can be done and then charge this authority with it rather than tossing it to

1	them and then I will be paying a high fee and getting
2	flooded three times a year going forward. So, I don't
3	think it's a big ask for you to pause and spend some
4	time maybe commissioning a study of what is possible.
5	And then and then take your action later after you've
6	considered that.
7	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Thank you very much.
8	JOHN BEIGHEY: Thank you.
9	ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Okay. Whoever this next
10	person is must be a doctor because I can't read your
11	name. Andrew is guessing perhaps a Dale, something
12	Court that begins with a B.
13	MR. SPENCER: Dale, is that you?
14	DALE BENEDUM: I'm Dr. Dale. Dale Benedum.
15	2 Brookview Court, Zelienople. Is that what it says?
16	Okay.
17	Just a quick history. When we got that five
18	inches of rain a couple of years ago, we had like eight
19	inches in our basement and we're not anywhere near a
20	flood plain and we just kind of ate it. And remember
21	the bridge by the old on 68 west of town right there by
22	the old fire station, that almost went out because
23	debris gathered behind it.
24	And to this day, nothing's ever been done with
25	Glade Run. Nobody ever come up the creek. Nobody ever

did nothing. People looked downtown and coming in from
like the park and cleaned out the stuff, but nobody does
anything there.

I personally clean the storm sewers beside my garage at the corner of -- right beside Mike's

Collision. I don't even know the name of the street. I literally take my tractor, yank the grate, take a post hole digger, clean out the storm sewers because a couple years ago, they were literally that far from being totally filled into the pipe. And that pipe runs the whole way to the creek.

And I kind of chuckle sometimes because people kind of clean up the grate, but they never pick out the grate and clean out the storm sewer. So, I actually like the grate semi covered because it filters the heavy stuff from going in. But the more that people clean it, I do it.

But regardless, what concerns me is what I don't hear is that we're just going to collect money and basically take -- I mean, these homes are already priced -- if you look at the tax rolls and look at comparable properties not in the flood plain, they're priced accordingly for being in a flood plain. People don't pay as much. They don't suffer as much. You don't buy them as much. You aren't taxed as high.

1 That's already one benefit.

If there's going to be a flood plain and you collect money, buy the houses and tear them down like they did over in Harmony, like they did over by Hartman's Resort. Whoever did that. That's the only permanent solution. And if it's a warehouse that has a lot of space, you can elevate offices. You can, you know.

There are -- I don't know what they sell. But you have to make a decision, do we want to be here and if you do, is it cost effective to waterproof it? But you can't just -- there are just places you really can't deal with and spend the money to correct. That area is always flooded.

I mean, my house never got flooded, but when we got that five inches of water, it come down whatever street in Timberbrook, jumped over the curb, went between two houses, and hit my garage broadside, went underneath my garage, went around my house on both sides, and flooded my basement. I didn't come screaming to anybody and say, hey, quick, I got flooded. Yes, I got flooded. It wasn't insured. I don't have flood insurance, don't qualify for flood insurance.

And you just -- there's sometimes you can't deal with it. There's just nothing you can really do. But

1	that's what I would really encourage if you want to stop
2	the problem, deal with the properties in a proactive
3	manner so the problem disappears.

4 ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Okay. Thank you very 5 much. Marsha Grabowski.

MARSHA GRABOWSKI: Hi. I'm Marsha. I live at 137 Oakdale Drive. And just, you know, a lot of questions again and maybe reiterating some of them, but are there shovel ready projects? You know. There have been studies done in the past. What have those studies suggested? Have those things been tried? And were they successful or not successful? Is that why you're, you know, thinking, even considering this new group, new committee, to try to solve the problems because you've been trying to solve the problems for years and it just keeps getting worse? You know.

If there is a list of projects, you know, where did that list come from? And who's going to prioritize those projects? Is reducing the major flooding in the town, is that the top priority with this committee that's being considered? And is there replacing infrastructure piping? Is that any major consideration with the plans?

And, you know, again, you know, where's the funding coming from? Has Butler County offered any

And also all the cost, you know, to spread the cost among people that aren't contributing to the problem. And I just -- we all know who -- why. The major problem is all the development that has happened in and around us. And, you know, that's -- I don't know. There's got to be a way that that has to be addressed. That's all.

ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Thank you. Those are all the people that have signed up. Is there anyone else? Any residents?

Would you come up to the microphone and state your name and address please.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: Before the next person comes, please come up. I would like everyone to know that we do have information on our website right now concerning projects that were funded. I'm not going to address anything directly, but the county did fund more than seven million, almost eight million dollars in projects, stormwater projects, prior to any of this. And we were the recipients as were all the communities in that that are contracting, joining this authority. And I would recommend that everyone look at everyone's

- websites and read that information. I apologize.
- 2 CINDY MELLENTHIN: No, that's okay. I have
- 3 no problem with that. My name is Cindy Mellenthin. I
- 4 live at 133 Oakdale Drive here in Zelie.
- 5 First off, I want to say, according to the
- 6 Articles of Incorporation, people, business owners,
- 7 churches, and non-profits can be taxed by an unelected
- 8 appointee with no qualifications required. No limits
- 9 are set on the tax rate right now, that we know of. No
- 10 limits are set on the spending. No clear explanation of
- distribution of funds. No limits are placed on the
- borrowing. Little financial visibility or oversight is
- 13 provided.
- Other municipalities can use Zelienople's streets,
- 15 roads, alleys, and easements for any purpose they can
- think of. We can't wait until the bylaws are written to
- 17 learn the answer to these questions. The problem is not
- getting the stormwater out of Zelienople. The problem
- is keeping stormwater out of Zelienople. That's keeping
- it. Not get it out, but keeping it out. That is a
- county problem. We can't afford to fix it.
- There are dozens of reasons to not pass this
- resolution. That's all I have to say at this point.
- 24 Thank you very much.
- 25 ATTORNEY BRIMMEIER: Thank you. Okay. Let

1	the record reflect there is no one else that wants to
2	speak, so we'll close the hearing. Thank you.
3	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HESS: Closing the hearing
4	at 6:53.
